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Searching the Self in Seoul Trans-youth and Urban Social Networking in Korea

The university entrance exam is a rite of passage in South Korea. This is a time when many young South Koreans are temporarily emancipated from the traditional pressures of collective belonging, providing a social break that allows self-reflection. This in-between demographic, or trans-youths, are neither children nor adults; they are also situated on the delicate border zone between digital natives and digital immigrants in Prensky's (2001) term. This paper reports on a research project that is investigating the mobile play culture of trans-youths in Seoul. Drawing on in-depth interviews with trans-youth, I analyze their search for identity through urban social networking. The discussion illustrates the self-searching of Seoul trans-youths, arguing that technological, socio-cultural and environmental (urban) contexts frame how mobility and ubiquity are (re)created in Seoul, one of the most connected densely populated and rapidly transforming metropolises in the world. The research provides an unprecedented insight into the lives of trans-youth, in turn illuminating the role of Seoul as a new urban social network.
